DAY OF ACTION UNITES WORKING PEOPLE IN ST. PAUL, NATIONWIDE By Michael Moore, Union Advocate

Working people filed the

Working people filled the Capitol rotunda in St. Paul today, celebrating their freedom to join together for a voice on the job and pledging to fight corporate attacks with urgency and solidarity.


"Unions are here for the common good," former St. Paul teacher Mary Cathryn Ricker, now vice president of the American Federation of Teachers, told hundreds of people gathered for the Working People's Day of Action. "And we are here for good."

The rally in St. Paul was one of more than two dozen across the country highlighting the benefits of collective bargaining and the critical role union members play in their communities.

Anne Bipes, who works as a secretary in a west-metro school district, attended the rally with members of her union, Service Employees Local 284. She said strong unions mean more than "just pay and benefits" for workers like her. "It's about equity and justice within our society, about equality for working people," Bipes explained.


The day of action comes two days before the U.S. Supreme Court will hear arguments in a lawsuit, bankrolled by corporate special interests, challenging the ability of Local 284 and other public sector employee unions to collect fairshare fees from workers they are legally required to represent.

The court's conservative majority is likely to side with the plaintiff in Janus v. AFSCME Council 31, and the decision, expected as early as April, could make right-to-work conditions in the public sector the law of the land.

But public-sector workers aren't cowering. They traveled in busloads to the Capitol, wore their union colors and carried signs vowing that no court ruling will keep them from joining together to fight for themselves and their communities.

Jim Glazer, a teacher in the South Washington County Schools and member of Education Minnesota, joined the rally to be "part of the energy" fueling actions across the country today.

I called her. She told me he lived. The doctors are optimistic for full recovery and if it wasn't for me being at the right place at the right time, he would not have lived. She said I was Angel's Guardian Angel. She thanked me for saving her fathers life and wants to remain in contact with me, to give me followups on his progress and would also like to put a face to the person who saved Angel's life.

Remembering the Day the Mail Stopped

At 12:01 a.m. on March 18, 1970, a courageous band of letter carriers in New York City launched what is now called the Great Postal Strike. On its 48th anniversary, the NALC remembers their actions and the legacy it left.

It's important to put the strike in its context. Postal workers had suffered a 50-year losing streak beginning with World War I. Pav scales were

frozen, then cut back, and even the "happy days" of the 1950s passed them by as President Eisenhower vetoed four postal salary bills.

By 1967, things were so bad that post office job turnover was around 25 percent a year. Under the gun from their bosses, local managers became increasingly authoritarian and letter carriers became increasingly exasperated and tired of being bullied and denied a living wage.

The National Association of Letter Carriers was caught between a political rock and a legal hard

place—a political establishment unwilling to deliver good wages, a decent workplace, and there was a legal ban on strikes by government employees.

At the stroke of midnight, members of Branch 36 began throwing up picket lines around post offices throughout Manhattan and the Bronx. Within hours, other branches joined in and the wildcat strike spread across the land.

> There is much more to this story, as told in the NALC history, Carriers in a Common Cause, but the key result was the adoption of the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970, which created the U.S. Postal Service. The act gave postal unions

the power to bargain for wages and benefits, and the ability to arbitrate contract disputes and enforce members' rights.

As bargaining begins on a new national agreement, we take a moment to say THANK YOU to the men and women who put their jobs on the line to protect themselves and the carriers who have followed in their footsteps.

50 Years Ago, the Strike That Brought MLK to Memphis

In his final days, Martin Luther King Jr. stood by striking sanitation workers.

Black sanitation workers had been attempting to organize since 1960, when T. O. Jones and O. Z. Evers began signing workers up with the Teamsters. However, many blacks were afraid to unionize due to fear of persecution. This fear proved justified in 1963, when 33 workers (including Jones) were all fired immediately after an organizing meeting they attended.

The workers had made a few attempts to strike, but their efforts had failed to attract the support of the clergy or the middle class. By February 1968, things had changed. Memphis' mayor, Henry Loeb, refused to negotiate with worker representatives and rejected a pay raise for workers that the city council had approved.

Years of poor pay and dangerous working conditions, and provoked by the crushing to death of workers Echol Cole and Robert Walker in garbage compactors, over 700 of the 1300 black sanitation workers met on Sunday, February 11, and agreed to strike.



Before he died on April 4, 1968, Martin Luther King Jr. also took an active role in mass meetings and street actions. He first visited the Memphis strike on March 18, speaking to an audience of thousands at Mason Temple.

They then did not turn out for work on the following day. They also sought to join the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) Local 1733.

The strike thus came to represent the broader struggle for equality within Memphis, whose many black residents lived

disproportionately in poverty. "*I Am A Man!*" emerged as a unifying civil rights theme.

The Memphis sanitation workers' strike is remembered as an example of powerless African-Americans standing up for themselves. It is also remembered as the prelude to the assassination of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

One hundred-fifty local ministers, led by the Rev. James Lawson, a friend of King's, organized to support the workers. King came to town and on March 18 delivered a speech to a crowd of around 15,000 people. He returned ten days later to lead a march. Though King's hallmark was nonviolent protest,

the demonstration turned violent, with stores being looted and the police shooting and killing a 16-year-old. Police followed retreating demonstrators to a landmark church, the Clayborn Temple, entered the sanctuary, released tear gas and, per one authoritative account, "clubbed people as they lay on the floor to get fresh air."

King's assassination on April 4, 1968 intensified the strike. Mayor Loeb and others feared rioting, which had already begun in Washington, D.C., Federal officials, including Attorney General Ramsey Clark, urged Loeb to make concessions to the strikers in order to avoid violence. Loeb refused.

On April 8, a completely silent march with Coretta Scott King attracted 42,000 participants. The strike ended on April 16, 1968, with a settlement that included union recognition and wage increases, although additional strikes had to be threatened to force the City of Memphis to honor its agreements. The period was a turning point for black activism and union activity in Memphis.

cause here: workers' rights and freedoms."

Public-sector workers aren't standing alone either. Private sector union members bolstered their ranks at the Capitol, as did allies from immigrant rights groups, faith organizations and the business community.

"What affects public workers will affect all workers," said Deb Haugen, a registered nurse at Children's Hospital in Minneapolis and member of the Minnesota Nurses Association. "For many years unions have set the standard for conditions in the workplace. If our voice is weaker, it's not only going to be felt by union workers, but by all of us."

Wendy Anderson, a Century Link retiree who remains active in her union, Local 7201 of the Communications Workers of America, said the landscape for unions is changing, but she thinks working people are up to the test.

"It doesn't matter if you're in the same union as me," Anderson said. "We're brothers and sisters, and we support each other."
