# The Senate should reject the Postal Reform Act of 2014 (S. 1486) Carper-Coburn bill embraces a flawed 'shrink to survive' strategy

On Feb. 6, 2014, the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs passed the Postal Reform Act of 2014 (S. 1486), which now awaits action by the full Senate. We urge the Senate to oppose the bill drafted by Sen. Tom Carper (D-DE) and Sen. Tom Coburn (R-OK) because it is loaded with devastating and unnecessary service cuts. These cuts would stop the recent USPS recovery in its tracks and threaten the future of the Postal Service—not to mention the \$1.1 trillion mailing industry. Rather than focus on measures that would strengthen the USPS, the bill embraces the agency's flawed "shrink to survive" strategy and includes panicky proposals formulated during the Great Recession that never made long-term sense. The legislation threatens nearly 100,000 postal jobs and 7.5 million private-sector jobs in the mailing industry. If enacted, S. 1486 would:

- Cut Saturday mail delivery after mail volume reaches a 140 billion pieces-per-year "trigger" point. This volume "trigger" is completely arbitrary; if reached, it would eliminate Saturday mail delivery without a Postal Regulatory Commission review even if USPS were profitable. This trigger is not necessary and would harm the Postal Service's ability to maintain existing business, attract new customers and fully take advantage of the e-commerce boom. (Estimated job cuts: 25,000 full-time city carrier jobs, 45,000 part-time rural carrier jobs and 10,000 other jobs, according to the USPS.)
- End door delivery for all businesses immediately, moving millions of businesses to cluster boxes, and encourage residential delivery conversions from door to curb or cluster box. Such a move would adversely affect up to 35 million American households and sever the valuable connection between carriers and the companies and home-based businesses they serve, and weaken the USPS' ability to generate new revenues through programs such as Customer Connect. (NALC estimate of job cuts: 20,000 city and rural carriers.)
- Allow additional cuts to service standards and mail processing facilities by October 2015. This would create further delays in delivery and less incentive for businesses to use the mail. Business customers who see this cut coming would likely factor it into decisions about investing in mail or using the Postal Service.
- Implement a second unfair mandate on the USPS to pre-fund billions of future employee expenses decades in advance, this time for workers' compensation benefits. No other company or agency faces this onerous requirement. Forcing the USPS to do it would starve it of resources needed to invest and innovate.
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- Allow the USPS to replace FERS pensions with 401(k)-type accounts for new employees via binding arbitration. This would create a morale-killing two-tier workforce and unfairly deny new employees equal treatment under the law.

We urge the Senate to reject the Postal Service's deeply flawed and outdated "shrink to survive" strategy and vote "No" on S. 1486 if it is considered. It's time for sensible reform that helps the Postal Service to innovate and expand services to the public and millions of businesses that rely on it.

## **Region 7 Report**

On February 7th the USPS released its quarterly financial report for the first quarter of fiscal year 2014. The report covers October through December 2013. USPS reports an operating profit of \$765 million, which continues a year long trend in financial stability. The dramatic turnaround is credited to an improving economy and a significant jump in parcel delivery. The hard work, dedication and service provided by letter carriers during the holiday season played a huge role in our success. While some of our competitors were criticized in the news because of late holiday delivery, the USPS didn't suffer network failure and received high marks for service. Look no further than the millions of packages Amazon sent via USPS and the high service satisfaction their customers reported. Now congress needs to constructively get off their behinds and pass postal reform legislation to preserve and strengthen the postal network by fixing the ridiculous prefunding mandate and allow us to evolve with the changing landscape. The postal service always has been, and always will be, vital to the US economy and the American people.

Deferred COLA Increase Due In accordance with the National Agreement, the first of two 2013 deferred COLA salary adjustments will be effective March 8th and included in your paycheck March 28, 2014. The first COLA was based on the increase in the CPI between July 2012 and January 2013. It amounts to 7 cents per hour, \$5.60 per pay period, \$146 annually. The COLA adjustment will be added to the Step O pay rates in Table 2 of the pay schedule. The pay rates of Steps A through N will be increased proportionately. For example, Step A is set at 61.5% of Step O, so the COLA for Grade 1 Step A is \$90 annually.

#### **USPS Plant Closings On Hold**

On February 14, the USPS notified the national unions that all excessing related to future plant closings is on hold indefinitely. Therefore, the postal service is releasing the residual vacancies withheld for impacted employees. Over the coming months the Western and Great Lakes Areas, in conjunction with the regional office, will be reviewing the status of each event and residual vacancy being withheld. If you have carrier jobs being withheld for clerk events, please contact my office in April. This will allow the parties time to jointly sort out the information. A copy of the USPS notification is included in this mailing.

#### Regional Training Materials Sent

You should have received the registration materials for regional training. The packets were mailed out the first week in February. Our training will take place at the Radisson Hotel in Roseville, MN, April 28 - May 2, 2014. If you didn't receive the mailing or need additional copies, please call the office and we will be happy to send them to you. Keep in mind,

# Executive Vice President's Report

#### Communication


Communication is nothing more than passing on information from one person to another, with one doing the speaking and one doing the listening. So why does it seem that we have so many problems with this supposedly easy process? As human beings, we can communicate on several levels, but as senders we communicate primarily through the spoken or written word.

One of the main jobs of the NALC and Branch 9 is to communicate whether it be with Postal management, Congress, the media or our own members. Both management and the union are in the communications business, so why do we continue to fail in the communicating process? The answer, you can only communicate with someone if they are willing to listen and compromise.

This question is heard on every workroom floor and at every one of our General Membership Meeting. While communicating with management is primarily conducted by the Branch officers and stewards we must also keep you, our members, informed. The best format and preferred method to receive this information is for you to attend our monthly meeting every 4th Tuesday of the month. If that is not possible Branch 9 has other ways of communicating with the membership and that is through flyers, letters, News by Nine and of course the Branch Nine News. We also ask the stewards to inform their stations about what was discussed at the meetings and also what is in the mailings we have recently sent out. This paper is the official publication of Branch 9. It provides information about the issues facing letter carriers and their families from inside and out of the Postal Service. The Banch Nine News is published 10 times a year, has a circulation of about 2400 copies, and is mailed all over the country. It works as a great communication tool. 

### **How to Retire, Part 2**

This is the second in a series of articles on HOW to Retire. Many of our members are eligible for retirement so It's a good idea to get a "Computer Generated Annuity Estimate". This in no way obligates you to retire at a certain time. It merely gives you a general idea of what your pension will look like, and what some of the bigger deductions will be (Survivor's Benefits, Health care premium deductions, etc). When you are serious about picking a date, all you have to do is to call Shared Services (1-877-477-3273) and pick Option 5. They will ask you what date you are thinking about, so they can send you an updated calculation. AGAIN, THIS IN NO WAY OBLIGATES YOU TO RETIRE ON THAT DATE, in case you change your mind. Personally, I would do this at least 2 months before you intend to retire.

Dealing with the Retirement Specialists in the Office of Shared Services has been a very pleasant surprise. In virtually all of the cases that I am familiar with surprisingly, the Retirement Counselors are on YOUR side.

Once you declare your intentions to retire, OPM will mail you "The Blue Book", which is a large 8x11 book full of information and all the forms you will need, again largely personalized. If there is some arcane form you need, OPM will have it in there. When I have dealt with them over the phone, they usually have the answers to the questions I hadn't even thought to ask.

While you're waiting for your Blue Book, start thinking of any guestions you might have, and write them down. The first thing the Retiree Counselors will want you to do is to call them and arrange a phone interview with one of them. Again, I was pleasantly surprised at how knowledgeable and helpful the person I spoke to was. My wife was on another phone line, and we peppered him with all sorts of questions. He had all the answers we needed. Furthermore, he actually went through my Blue Book with me, and told me what to put down for information. Although I didn't do so, I could have filled out all the necessary forms while on the phone.

Let me give you an example of a bit of confusion he helped me with. He asked me when my official retirement date was? I told him I supposed January 1, because that's when I wanted my first annuity check. Well, he said, what is the last day you will be working? I said December 3. "In that case," he corrected me, "your official retirement date will be December 4" --- because if I retired January 1, I wouldn't get a pension check until February 1. I did as he said, and everything worked perfectly. So I strongly encourage you to lean on the expertise of these people.

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
of the convention center. Additional details and information regarding our gathering will be mailed to you at a later date.

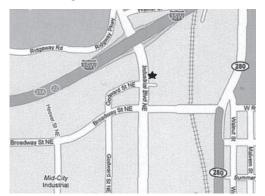
